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## Memory and Remembrance by: Jeffrey Bamaca



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It is now more important than ever to intentionally remember and celebrate the voices and legacies of our Hispanic and Latino cultures, especially in contexts in which our histories are being suppressed and erased. As a scholar of the ancient world, as I reflect on the significance of memory and remembrance, a letter from the Roman senator, Pliny the Younger, comes to mind.

In the early second century, Pliny the Younger was traveling to Tibur. Along the Via Tiburtina, half a mile east of Rome, he spotted a monument dedicated to Marcus Antonius Pallas, a freedman and former slave of emperors Claudius and Nero. Pliny was astounded and offended, perceiving the honors as a mockery. Troubled by the rise to power of a formerly enslaved person, Pliny expressed his disbelief at the recognition of someone he considered "dirt." Pliny's issue was that imperial freedmen and enslaved people were viewed as obstacles to a functioning government, and their access to power, even if they were Christian freedmen, was considered grotesque. Pliny's letter illuminates the intricate dynamics of navigating our past—histories that at times evoke repulsion but also hope.

In thinking about memory and remembrance, in his letter to the Philippians, Paul sends greetings to Christians in Caesar's household who some scholars believe might have been enslaved Christians (4:22). Regardless, the idea of Christians in the emperor's household (and eventually the emperor himself) would become a formational mark of power in Christian cultural history.

A mark whose reverberations we are still feeling today. It offered a powerful cultural discourse through which Christians could construct meaning and, ultimately, project themselves imperially (Christians in Caesar's Household, 22).

For better or worse, therein lies the power of memory – it is more than a mere recording of the past but a process through which identity is formed. Hispanic Heritage Month then is an opportunity to participate in a formational process – to remember where we have come from, recognize where we find ourselves, and dream about where we can go.

In his book, Mañana: Christian Theology from a Hispanic Perspective, Justo Gonzalez poignantly identifies the cultural amnesia that was present and is still prevalent today (4). This amnesia is characterized by the "forgetting" of our origins, specifically the denial of our violent histories and the suppressing of our stories of migration. Remembering then is vital because it can serve as an antidote to this amnesia. This Hispanic Heritage Month then, let us reflect honestly about our histories and think about what it means to be the Latino church today.

May this serve as an invitation to remember that we cannot engage in the task(s) of theology alone – apart from our histories or communities. In John's prologue, we read that the word became flesh and in doing so entered history, making our stories his own (1:14). Let us then courageously engage our histories and celebrate the beauty of our heritage.

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## The "Maestro a Maestro" retreat concludes, leaving the participants transformed.

Orlando, FL – The highly anticipated "Maestro a Maestro" retreat, an intensive, immersive, in-person course designed for Hispanic theological education, successfully concluded its week-long program on August 1st. Hosted in Orlando, Florida, the retreat welcomed 13 dedicated participants from across the nation, all instructors from Bible institutes and ministry formation programs of the esteemed <u>Capacity Building for Bible Institutes</u> cohort, a collaborative program between AETH and Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary with the purpose of building the capacity of the Bible institutes and strengthening their unique role within the ecology of theological education.

The course was spearheaded by renowned experts in theological education, Dr. Elizabeth Conde-Frazier and Prof. Iraida Pizarro, whose leadership guided the attendees through a rich curriculum. Complementing the academic rigor and adding a spiritual dimension to the retreat, Chaplain Rev. Omar Johnson enriched the retreat and led the liturgical sessions, fostering an environment of reflection and profound growth.

Upon receiving their participation certificates, the participants expressed profound gratitude. Attendees universally lauded the week as "compelling" and "transformational," others declared to have more clarity into the "role of the Bible institute." Early feedback offered an enthralling glimpse into their deeply positive experiences. "After this retreat, I realized the role of the Bible institute as a work of justice... How the Bible institute can partner with God in the work of social holiness," explained Professor Jeffrey Bamaca of RLA College.

Professor Carito Heraldez from Centro Hispano de Estudios Teológicos - CHET added:

"This week I received powerful, robust, transformative training, focused on a practical theology for structuring critical thinking and critical reflections, on how to pose real problems and seek viable, transformative proposals so we can bring this information and learning to our institutes, work hand in hand with them, and increasingly improve all of our institutional processes—the pastoral and theological aspects we're developing. It's been an incredible experience for me because I feel equipped to share this knowledge with my colleagues and with the team. And the number one goal, I believe, that every teacher should have in their hearts is how to implement it with the goal of transforming lives, transforming minds and hearts, and impacting the lives of others. So, I believe these are very powerful, necessary, up-to-date, and relevant tools needed to review what we're doing. And by reviewing them, they will generate proposals, concerns, and new ways of rethinking, relearning, unlearning, and focusing on what the future holds for us as an institute."

For her part, Professor Ramona Acevedo who teaches at Instituto Bíblico Ebenezer states, "I came with expectations of learning something more, because we're always learning, but this time I was amazed because it wasn't just adding to what I know, what I know about being a teacher, it was something deeper, something more beautiful. I had an experience with a strategy I learned years ago, but I didn't really put it into practice. I didn't work on it. And now in this workshop we worked on it, and it helped me to be concise, it helped me see things a little more differently. It opens your mind. I always think I have an open mind for learning. But in a way where, as we say in English, 'a wild moment.' And I think it was an experience. It was intense, but the experience you receive, the information you receive, is worth it. To recommend it... yes. But you have to come with an open mind and be prepared to truly be challenged, because this isn't just about, 'Okay, I have an open mind. Don't worry.' No. You will be challenged, and you need to accept that learning is much more, deeper than you can imagine."

The "Maestro a Maestro" course, which ran from July 28th to August 1st, has undoubtedly left an enduring and positive impact on all who attended.

**2025** has been an enriching experience for our Young Líderes program. We launched with an online gathering titled Young Líderes who? In which all participants were invited to discover what the young líderes program was about. We followed up that session with *Theology* en el barrio with Dr. Omar Palafox. Where he guided us though how to continue to shape our leadership as we lead in our different contexts. Our last two online gatherings continued to build momentum by continuing to offer safe spaces for learning and development. These sessions not only strengthened the confidence and skills of participants but also created a sense of community where young leaders could share ideas, collaborate and envision their impact together.

The gathering on *Leadership Development* with Alexandra Zareth emphasized building leadership capacity by fostering critical reflection, cultural competency and collaboration. Participants have learned practical tools to strengthen their roles as leaders in their local contexts while connecting with peers who share similar commitments to faith, justice, and service.

In **partnership with the Justo and Catherine González Resource Center** the program launched a special track dedicated to writing for print publication. This initiative has guided participants through the process of developing their voices as writers, preparing them for contributions. This yearlong track will offer young líderes the opportunity to build their proposals.

The Young Líderes program continues to serve as a vital space for equipping and accompanying emerging leaders within the Latin/a/o/x community. Through a series of online gatherings, the program has provided opportunities for growth in leadership development and skills for writing for print publication, preparing participants to engage meaningfully in their communities and within broader theological conversations. **We are meeting in person next month in San Dimas, CA!**
